

SALT LAKE COUNTY COLLECTIVE IMPACT ON HOMELESSNESS SHARED OUTCOMES

OUTCOMES FOR COUNTY RESIDENTS EXPERIENCING OR AT-RISK FOR HOMELESSNESS

- We recognize and meet the distinct needs of these atrisk and homeless populations
- We successfully divert individuals and families from emergency shelter whenever possible
- We meet the basic needs of those in crisis
- We provide individuals and families with stabilization services when they need them

OUTCOMES FOR THE COUNTY'S HOMELESS SERVICE AND HOUSING SYSTEMS

- Salt Lake County's homelessness rates decrease over time
- Coordinated entry and a common, consistent tool provide appropriate, timely access to services across the system.
 There is no 'wrong door'
- Individuals who are homeless have a relationship with a caseworker or similar individualized support
- Individuals who exit homelessness will be employed and/or have increased income/financial stability

SALT LAKE COUNTY COLLECTIVE IMPACT ON HOMELESSNESS SHARED OUTCOMES

OUTCOMES TO PREVENT HOMELESSNESS

- Salt Lake County's housing supply meets the demand and needs of all residents
- People have access to the specific services and supports they need to avoid homelessness
- Children and adolescents transitioning to adulthood do not experience homelessness
- If individuals and families become homeless, we prevent it from happening again

OUTCOMES FOR COMMUNITIES AND PUBLIC SPACES

- Neighborhoods that host homeless service facilities are welcoming and safe for all who live, visit, work, recreate, receive services or do business there
- Neighborhoods offering services also offer access to employment, job training and positive activities during the day




